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



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

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BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

The major practice was carried out at Extension Office, Research Extension and Training Complex (RET), Central Luzon State University, Science City of Muñoz, Nueva Ecija. The actual training was conducted from January 23 to March 29, 2019 with a total of 240 hours.

The major practice aimed to expose students to all actual and proper management practices in agricultural extension and capacitate senior students on the major competencies.

The major practice student was assigned in vegetable production in mango techno demo site. Different varieties of crops were planted such as hot pepper, onion leeks and eggplant. These crops were planted in order to maximize the usage of the area of techno-demo site and likewise to showcase the technology.

The major practice activities and outputs were based in the major areas of competencies in agricultural extension.
